

The Civil War

Pre-Visit Lesson

Grades: 5th & 8th

Class Time Needed: 40 minutes

Big Idea

Students will understand the division that led to the Civil War as well as Maryland's role as a border state.

Maryland Curriculum Standards Social Studies Framework

- Essential Question (5th grade): How did conflicts over slavery result in the Civil War?
- Essential Question (8th grade): How did regional tension challege national unity?
- Essential Question (8th grade): What factors lead a country to Civil War?

- Writing & coloring utensils of your choice
- Internet access
- Projection screen

Lesson Procedure

Introduction:

Begin the lesson by establishing any prior knowledge students have about the Civil War. If needed, supplement knowledge with the video in the "Teacher Resources" section to make sure students understand the causes and tensions leading to the Civil War.

Direct Instruction:

Complete the Civil War Map worksheet with students. This can be done by working together as a class with the teacher leading studnets through instructions or having studnets complete the map independently (or in pairs/groups). If students are working independently or in groups, come together as a calss to review the correct answers at the end of the lesson.

Conclusion:

Using the knowledge developed from the video and map activity, have students participate in the following discussion:

- Why was Maryland an important state during the time of the Civil War?
- Why do you think railroads were an important resource during the Civil War?
- What do we mean when we say Maryland was a "border state?"
- How does the succession of Southern states during the Civil War still affect our nation today?
