

# B&O Railroad Museum Unveils First Streamlined Diesel-Electric Passenger Locomotive Restoration

Baltimore, MD – On February 1, 2021, the B&O Railroad Museum unveils the complete cosmetic restoration of the B&O Number 51, built in 1937 the first streamlined diesel-electric locomotive. An innovation of the time, the B&O diesel-electrics were touted as modern locomotives, assuring smoother, more comfortable rides without the need for frequent changes of engines on longer trips. This modernization contributed greatly to ending the era of steam locomotives and launched the age of diesel power in the industry.

## **Luxury Travel**

During the 1930s, commercial airliners offered consumers more choices in travel cutting into railroad travel as the standard. To compete, B&O advertisements featured rail lines such as the Capitol Limited (between Chicago and the East) as diesel-powered, streamlined, carrying the most modern Pullman cars and serviced by a train secretary, maid-manicurist, and barber-valets. Travelers were pictured enjoying a lounge-like atmosphere in an observation car on the Capitol Limited (shown right).



### **Labor of Love**

The cosmetic restoration of the Number 51 included uncovering decades of life on the railroad and took five years to complete. The 51 was a skeleton and completely restored through metalwork, carpentry, and artisanal painting. The restoration team analyzed the original paint colors to create its modern formula, utilized original engineer blueprints for lettering, even built an English wheel tool to recreate the curved stainless steel ornament giving the locomotive its modern art deco lines, and so much more. "This was a labor of love for all of us at the B&O," said Kris Hoellen, Executive Director. "The Museum's restoration team are true artists and of course, mega railroad fans. We are proud to bring such an important and beautiful locomotive back to her original glory when she rolled out in 1937 and thrilled to share this important piece of American railroad history with everyone." The #51 will be showcased in the Roundhouse for the month of February along with its original blueprints.
