

The Civil War

Post-Visit Lesson

Grades: 5th & 8th grade Class Time Needed: 45 minutes

Big Idea

Students will understand how the end of the American Civil War changed many aspects of life in the United States.

Maryland Curriculum Standards Social Studies Framework

- Essential Question (5th grade): How did the conclusion of the Civil War affect the United
 States (North and South) and Maryland?
- Essential Question (8th grade): How does war impact and change society?

Materials Needed

- Device with internet access (phone or ipad or laptop) for each student pair
- Research QR codes printed and placed around classroom (provided at end of lesson plan)
- Clipboards (one per student pair)
- Student response paper (printed one per student pair)
- Pencils
- Headphones for each pair of students (optional)

Lesson Procedure

Introduction:

The United States in 1865 looked very different from 1860 which was before the American Civil War began. There are four themes that will be explored in today's lesson:

- How did the use of coal and coal mining change the United States after the Civil War?
- How did the freedom of black Americans change the United States after the Civil War?
- How did the use of iron and metal for transportation (instead of wood) change the

United States after the Civil War?

• How did the assassination of President Abraham Lincoln change the United States after the Civil War?



Lesson Procedure Continued

Direct Instruction (Student Activity):

In order to explore these questions, students will work with a partner and a device. They will walk around the classroom to scan QR codes and learn more about each topic. Students should scan at least 4 QR codes and write the information they learned on the Student Response Sheet.

Conclusion:

Using a digital platform (Seesaw, Google Classroom, Class Dojo, Flipgrid, Padlet, etc), have a way for students to share one thing they learned during the activity. Have a class discussion about the similarities, differences and answers to the questions/themes from the beginning of class.
